

'Rituals and taboos play an important role in human lives and help reinforce norms, behaviors, relationships and also in - rites of passage, holidays, political rituals, and even daily actions that can be redirected from moments that stimulate consumption to those that reconnect people with the planet and remind them of their dependence on Earth for continued well-being.'

Prelude -

How does Transition create new holidays and celebrations? Enjoy the transition tales 3 video interviews.

Intro -

First, we learn to create and share customs and traditions from family and key institutions. The supportive idea is that we **practice** to raise the flag or pick apples with the Scout troop in the Fall. We can develop and practice new values with in the Chaos Era. **New traditions can lead to new mythology.**

Resilience is now LinkedIn jargon but is a critical community building glue and plays a role in each transition between the fives sequences (Values > Customs > Initiations > Traditions > New Mythology).

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Defining the Sequence Terms -

A personal <u>value</u> is an individual's absolute or relative and ethical value, the assumption of which can be the basis for ethical action. A value system is a set of consistent values and measures. A principle value is a foundation upon which other values and measures of integrity are based.

A <u>Custom</u> is an action or way of behaving that is usual and traditional among the people in a particular group or place.

<u>Initiation</u> is a rite of passage marking entrance or acceptance into a group or society. It could also be a formal admission to adulthood in a community or one of its formal components. In an extended sense it can also signify a transformation in which the initiate is 'reborn' into a new role.

A <u>tradition</u> is a belief or behavior passed down within a group or society with symbolic meaning or special significance with origins in the past. A number of factors can exacerbate the loss of tradition, including industrialization, globalization, and the assimilation or marginalization of specific cultural groups.



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Issues -

- [1.] We need new symbols now, called artifacts in the Myth Lab). New symbols as catalysts of change- esp. for children. Sharing by humans is connected to a deep care for Nature. Nature shares with us and we practice with each other.
- [2.] The 5 levels in the Sequence are a social scaffold, supporting other integrations and empowerment.
- [3.] Questions: Can new traditions cross national and religious boundaries in this bloody and fractious time?



"New Sharing & Return Rituals & Their Symbols in Transition" - by Willi Paul

One critical mandate for the Transition Movement in the present <u>Chaos Era</u> is to create <u>new myths</u> and associated rituals that guide us. What rituals do you participate in now; as a child? Do your stories speak to a world in turmoil? Who controls the narrative? This is a call for new rituals: a universal sharing and return to family, city core, gardens, fields, water, soul and Nature.

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Definitions

Ritual (2)

(a) A <u>ritual</u> "is a sequence of activities involving gestures, words, and objects, performed in a sequestered place, and designed to influence preternatural entities or forces on behalf of the actors' goals and interests." Rituals may be prescribed by the traditions of a community, including a religious community.

(b) Semi-regular gathering of family or community members that share a Nature-based experience, value or dream often associated with formal roles and traditions. (W. Paul)

Universal

(c) A globally understood sign (i.e. - meaning) that mandates care for all cultures. (W. Paul)

Return

(d) To come back home; re-integrate; initiate; honor and acknowledge the sacred in all things. (W. Paul)

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New Sharing & Return Rituals

The Return of Ivory to Native Lands

In Chiang Mai, <u>Thailand</u>, elephants are healed and cared for on farms for visitors and locals alike. The big mammals are protected from poachers and considered sacred. Are they our equals? Can we see that Asian elephants and all earthly beings are part of a global family? That the return of stolen tusks from world-wide black markets is an act of healing, honor and learning with Nature. Tusk revenue returned to the farms support preservation and education. This program of "international return" to local care is a ritual of love, sharing and support.

Soil Building

With neighbors we clear grass heavy lands with controlled fires and shovels as a safety precaution and for soil building, turning-over the burnt wood and ash, adding compost from the neighborhood bins and then replanting. With permaculture, we share knowledge and resources to keep fire on our side and to obtain healthy soils and sustainable yields.

Harvest Dance

Together we celebrate both Nature and Permaculture calendars, our union of science and spirit at last. Picking each crop as it matures, teaching the youth to dance, to sort, peel, prepare and cook for their sharing dance, a seasonal celebration.

Taking Down the Fences

Localization in the back yard! From a pragmatic point of view, taking down your fences can mean better friendships with your neighborhoods, a heightened sharing opportunity! Property lines are gone, yielding larger gardens and shared yields! Here is a return to our extended family of humans and animals, increasing views and openings to a local horizon; building resilience, trust and sharing between often fearful and isolated strangers.

The Convergence

The New College is born! The Convergence is a spirit recharger, a fun zone, full of agriculture lessons, dancing

allowed! The Convergence brain thrust propels our union, sharing tech and spirit alike; accelerating our paradigm shift to a new land.

Sharing Expo

Bring what you have, take what you need. Ask a question, make a friend! Extend the Good Will model? The Sharing Expo is a true "Win-Win", building and sharing the new network all at once; dissolving capitalism with new rituals.

"Alice Greening and the Parking Lot Sharing Expo."

"At this special holiday event, we'll have a re-gifting exchange, share holiday decor, and have a few holiday-themed demos. Bring your bikes, bike supplies, homegrown fruit, vegetables, eggs, herbs, honey, flowers, paints, markers, books, shirts, skirts, pants, fabric, yarn, paper, sheet music, patterns, books, garden tools, craft tools, toys, kits, seeds, unwanted gifts, and more. Be sure to bring a bag to take home the bounty, so you'll have enough for gifts!"

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A local seventh grade girl from East Palo Alto is curious to experience what her teacher calls the "new local economy." Alice Greening rides her bike over HW 101 to Palo Alto to check-out a new kind of "neighborhood sharing event" that looks at first glance like her thrift shop turned inside out! Curiously she finds an old silver dollar in the shrubbery as she parks her bike and wonders what she can buy with it. Each time she gets the

same response: "Nothing! What do have to share?"

Her first stop is the bike man who is giving his time and expertise for free to tune-up everyone's two wheelers. Alice sees a ton of bikes at the gig. But where is the car repair booth, she wonders? What she doesn't get yet is that sharing is part of a larger heart-felt movement to create <u>local relationships and resilient communities</u>.

"Cars are losing favor in this circle," she smirks. With her old Schwinn now tried and true, she looks for another table to explore.

"Come over here dear, calls the cookie lady!" "Do you want to put some frosting on a cup cake and eat it at the Expo?"

"Are you teaching us something, Ma'am?"

"Oh Yes, indeed. I am sharing my experience as a start-up home bakery business. Frost-up a red velvet while I explain the bizz: batter to sprinkles!"

Alice walks on, rubbing her silver dollar and whipping off frosting from her cheeks, chagrinned, wondering if anyone at this strange Expo will ask her to spend it. Ahead on her right, a large blue sheet is on the ground, covered with little piles of clothes. A woman drops clothes onto the sheet and walks on while another is sizing up a blouse.

"What are you looking for today? "Alice asks the woman.

"Nothing special. Just good to hang out here. In Brazil we have a family tradition of sharing; we need no parking lot expo to take care of our generations!" Alice is admiring a red scarf.

"It's yours honey! Give back what you can!"

There are many exciting things just ahead in the parking lot, and many colorful people to check-out. Piles of books, house plants, fabrics and seeds. People playing weird instruments.

Alice guesses and says hello to one of the organizers of the Expo.

"Ma-am?"

"Hi!"

"None of my friends are here today. Can we hook-up our neighborhoods somehow?"

"Can I ask you to take back some flyers to your churches and schools?"

"Cool beans."

"Ma'am?"

"Yes, Alice!?"

"Here is a dollar for the sharing fund."



"<u>All Soils Day"</u> - An Alternative Thanksgiving Sharing Experience for the Community. <u>New Myth #90</u> by Willi Paul, Mythologist

"Love thy neighborhood" (W. Paul 2009)

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All Soils Day (ASD) changes the traditional fall harvest celebration from a family eating focus to a neighborhood food sharing event. This holiday stresses replenishment and unity.

ASD builds resilience by combining and reinforcing existing neighborhood communication, betterment and security programs like Nextdoor.com, Neighborhood Watch, Neighborhood Revitalization Program, the Permaculture Guild and the sea level rise campaigns.

The first stage of All Soils Day is an outside, afternoon event facilitated by The Arbor Day Foundation:

In mid-October, at a City or County Park, citizens are asked to bring a cup of soil from their boulevards for a tree planting ceremony where they will plant 4 - 12 sapling fruit trees in a Peace Circle. A lesson on composting is included.

The second part of the celebration combines the values of the local shelter program with the food bank network. Neighborhood folks canvas their piece of the local world, meeting and greeting and asking for donations - a new twist on the old trick and treating.

Finally, before a neighborhood supper, people meditate on the synergies and lessons learned from the program and how ASD might be permanently expanded into their neighborhood ecosystem and their personal priorities.

Pray: Replenish the collective soil and spirit. Enrich the earth and our souls.

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5 questions for rani by Willi

Do you think that the Expo crowd could evolve into something new, a new community perhaps, independent of the City and other groups?

The shares have certainly brought together people of diverse interests, including those who are not affiliated with Transition, and even those who have not yet embraced the idea of community-building or reuse as a means to combat climate change. I think that diverse group could certainly evolve into its own community, but I hope that it serves more as a link, connecting people across interests, and serving as an inspirational ground for people to find creative ways to connect with others. We are building up to a larger reskilling event next year, so I do hope to see the community becoming more integrated and more prominent in Palo Alto.

How does permaculture fit into the "alt-economy" mission of the Transition Movement?

I'm not well-versed in permaculture, but from what I understand, the idea of a long-term, holistic solution is common to both. I really have taken to the idea of doing something outside the box of what is considered the mainstream, but doing it in simple, harmless ways that everyone can appreciate and come to love. For example, when we share produce or items we no longer need with others in our community, we are in some way subverting the culture that says we must buy and spend our money to get what we need and want, which is more of everything.

At the same time, we enjoy the process, because we get to meet our neighbors, we find something that's often unique and has a history, and we take what we really can use, leaving the rest to the community. I think permaculture also offers that dream - that one can take and still leave the rest for the use of the community, and that everything has its place and its own history in the larger scheme of things.

What are your favorite reskilling opportunities? Are these the same activists that you enjoyed as a child?

I adore anything craft-related, especially when it uses found materials and things that would otherwise end up in the landfill. I started with that very young - making little notebooks out of scraps of junk mail and stickers that had lost their glue and giving them as gifts to teachers. I think as I have grown, my interests have also diversified - I love cooking, preserving, knitting, appreciating nature. Last year we had a bread-making skill share, and I've been making my own bread ever since.

Do we need new songs, symbols and/or myths for the Transition? Who are a few of your heroes?

It's truly important to have songs and symbols and stories for Transition. Some of my favorite things about my culture (my family is from India) go back to my grandparents and great-grandparents. My great-grandfather was one of the early (honest!) Indian politicians, so he and Mahatma Gandhi are definitely among my heroes, as well as Subramania Bharathi, whose songs rang with truth and freedom in those times. In modern days, I can cite my parents and my husband and so many friends for their strength to do what it takes for their convictions especially when it's certainly not the easy thing to do.

How does the Common Ground Store integrate with the event?

The Common Ground store generously and regularly offers us space and supplies and free advertising for our event, and everyone there is thoroughly supportive of our efforts! It's beautiful to be back there behind the plants and know that people can go into the store and learn from their workshops the same values that we espouse. I'm hopeful that we can continue to collaborate and find more ways to connect with Common Ground and the community with these events.
